


Private Event Space

Block 41 is Seattle's most industrial-chic downtown venue. The former ice warehouse offers three separate spaces on two levels, plus a private landscaped courtyard. Block 41 was designed by Graham Baba Architects, Stephen Hirt, Tom Sturge and Meg Bye. Old growth timber, exposed brick and vintage car decking merge gracefully with blackened steel, leather column wraps, and state-of-the-art building systems. With the ability to comfortably accommodate up to 721 guests, Block 41 is perfect for weddings, corporate meetings, conferences, fundraisers, holiday parties, bar/bat mitzvahs, fashion shows, food and wine tastings, production and more!

Ewing. Bert believed in paying it forward. He boasted about his company's profit-sharing plan and how it helped employee loyalty.
